

How are the children? This question guides my work as the superintendent of School District Five of Lexington and Richland Counties. The central purpose of a school system is to educate children. In order to educate all students, our district is tasked with creating the best conditions for all students to develop their full potential. Meeting the needs of 17,502 individual students is no small feat. As a result, we rely on our District Strategic Plan as our blueprint for success. The strategic plan begins with the vision of our school system. We created our shared vision in August of 2021, when 2,600 employees were asked, "Why do you work in School District Five of Lexington and Richland Counties?" Each response was coded by theme and provided a weight according to how many people indicated that theme. Eighty-three percent (83%) of the respondents stated that "Loving and Growing" our students was the main reason they work in the district. One hundred percent (100%) of the respondents stated that they worked in our district for the children.



The needs of children are ever-changing, and successful schools and districts work hard to meet the ever-changing needs of students. A worldwide pandemic created new health protocols, mental health challenges, and learning deficits and will require a robust partnership between students, parents, schools, community partners, and businesses to overcome these challenges. We did our best to keep schools open and keep the community informed of the spread of the virus through our COVID-19 Dashboard. Our color-coded mitigation dashboard received the Golden Achievement Award from the SC chapter of the National School Public Relations Association (SCNSPRA). School District Five created a Whole Child "Umbrella" Continuum of services to meet the ever-growing needs of our students. The continuum includes the physical safety and mental health of students and staff. Our District has devoted millions of dollars to the safety upgrades of our schools. These upgrades include School Resource Officers and/or armed security officers and weapon detection devices in every school. Additionally, we are in the process of updating our buildings with security vestibules, door sensors on exterior doors, and updating our camera systems to strengthen our protections. We have increased our response to the mental health challenges facing students and staff in School District Five. The addition of certified clinical counselors and the Care Solace partnership allow us to more efficiently connect our families with social, emotional and health services, and we are better positioned to address the barriers to learning that impact students daily.

Despite all the challenges facing our schools over the past year, our teachers and staff have seen amazing success and growth for our students. As a result, our district is a leader in our state in academics, arts, and athletics. The numbers are clear. Niche.com ranked our teachers #3 in SC, they ranked the District #2 in SC, and they ranked us as the #1 Best District to teach in SC. We are proud of these accomplishments, but much is on the horizon.

In order for all students to feel loved and be able to grow, we have to address three (3) major growth challenges (1) the growth in mental health issues, (2) the growth in student ELA/Math grade-level proficiency, and (3) the growth of student enrollment in Chapin schools and the growing facility needs of Irmo schools. Each of these challenges of growth provides an opportunity for progress. For example, we plan to (A) increase mental health services and develop a district wide social emotional learning program, (B) connect each student with a trusted adult to assist with academics and goal setting while maximizing the potential of our students in world-class honors programs and (C) create a 5 year master facilities plan that provides equity and access for all students in our district. In 2023, I will update the Board of Trustees and community at board meetings and community forums on our progress on these challenges and opportunities.

I am confident that together we will overcome and turn all challenges into opportunities to answer the question, "How are the children?" with the response, "All the children are well!"

ABOUT OUR DISTRICT

School District Five of Lexington & Richland Counties encompasses a land area of approximately 196 square miles, approximately one-half of which is situated in each of Lexington and Richland Counties. The District is primarily a residential suburb located to the northwest of the city of Columbia, the capital city of South Carolina. Included in the District are the towns of Irmo and Chapin. The school district has three attendance areas: Chapin, Dutch Fork, and Irmo. District Five operates a total of 13 elementary schools, two intermediate schools, three middle schools, four high schools. one Center for Advanced Technical Studies and one alternative school.

School District Five offers educational programs that challenge and stimulate thinking and problem solving and foster superior achievement. Our comprehensive educational program focuses on both academic and personal success for all students, from early childhood education through grade 12 and includes both adult and community education programs.

H. E. Corley Elementary School Leadership Magnet and Montessori Magnet and Spring Hill High School Career Pathways Magnet named National Magnet Schools of Excellence.

Irmo High School International School for the Arts, Leaphart Elementary School STEAM Magnet and the STEM Program at Dutch Fork High School have been named National Magnet Schools of Distinction.

To receive a national merit award, members of Magnet Schools of America must submit a detailed application that is scored by a panel of educators. These schools are judged and scored on their demonstrated ability to raise student academic achievement, promote racial and socioeconomic diversity, provide integrated curricula and instruction, and create strong family and community partnerships that enhance the school's magnet theme.





CAREER & TECHNICAL EDUCATION

The SkillsUSA Chapter located at the Center for Advanced Technical Studies (The Center) has been named a SkillsUSA Models of Excellence Chapter for 2022 in the Framework component of Personal Skills.

The Center SkillsUSA Chapter is one of 24 SkillsUSA chapters across the nation to achieve Models of Excellence status. The SkillsUSA's Chapter Excellence Program honors chapters for exemplary work in supporting the SkillsUSA Framework of developing personal, workplace, and technical skills grounded in academics. The Framework illustrates the intentional learning of critical workplace skills sought by industry.

LEADER IN ME

H. E. Corley Elementary School has received recertification as a Leader in Me Lighthouse School by FranklinCovey Education.

The re-certification reflects the school's dedication to and effectiveness in teaching leadership principles, fostering a leadership culture and aligning academic systems through student-led achievement and empowering instruction.

A significant benchmark, applying for this certification typically occurs three to five years after a school begins the Leader in Me process.

Amy Carter, an English teacher at Chapin High School was named the 2022 South Carolina Teacher of the Year.

MILKEN EDUCATOR AWARD

Dutch Fork Middle School English teacher Lesley Snyder was surprised with the prestigious Milken Educator Award and a check of \$25,000. Snyder received the award for her work encouraging student-led learning through "passion projects," serving as a teacher mentor and school leader, and pushing her students to reach their full potential through a variety of educational opportunities.

Snyder is among more than 60 educators nationwide to receive the recognition during the 2021-2022 school year and is the only recipient in South Carolina.

2022 PRESIDENTIAL AWARD

Director of Personnel Dr. Reggie Wicker was nominated for the Presidential Award by the outgoing President of the South Carolina Alliance of Black School Educators (SCABSE) for being a member who has demonstrated exceptional work in education and has supported the philosophy and goals of the organization.

The mission of SCABSE is to ensure a high quality education for all children, particularly for African-American children by establishing coalitions, providing forums, facilitating the placement of African-American professionals, and influencing public policy.



WRESTLING STATE CHAMPIONS

Chapin High School's Patrick Brophy completed an unbeaten season by winning the 5A 195-pound title. For Brophy, this win capped off his perfect season. "It is great to see hard work pay off and I am thankful for everyone that helped me along the way."


Chapin Wrestling Coach Bret Dye said, "I could not be prouder of Patrick Brophy's accomplishments this season. His hard work and dedication to the sport is truly unmatched. He has been a dream to coach."

Irmo High School's Justin Hayes won his second state championship as he claimed the Class 4A 160-pound crown. Hayes won at 152 last year.

Hayes was able to navigate the season with only one loss. "Winning this state title for a second time is just refreshing to me," Hayes said. "Irmo as a school has being going through some tough times, and it just feels good for the community and school to have something to celebrate. I will always be glad to represent Irmo High School. Irmo is a wonderful school and I wouldn't go to another school if I had the option."

Irmo High School's Head Wrestling coach Steven Paratto said Justin had a hard task ahead of him last year preparing for and winning the state title but that was nothing compared to this year. "This year he had a target on his back and everyone was watching and studying him. I also challenged him to get other kids on the team to follow him. He took on that challenge and was a great example to the younger wrestlers. He pushed them and talked to them all season. He learned from last year that the hard work and sacrifice does pay off in the end."





CHEER CHAMPIONS

Chapin High School varsity cheer won the South Carolina High School League Division 5A state championship. The team finished with a score of 349, 11 points shy from perfect.

"After runner up last year, we were determined to bring the title back to Chapin! The work ethic and determination by these ladies was amazing," said Chapin Varsity Cheer head coach Vicki Williams.


